



I have a feeling 20 seconds or less is going to take home the trophy this year.

Thanks to all of the District officers for the outstanding programs they assembled this year. I thought the content of the programs was top notch and most meetings were very well attended. I think the Northwest District is in for a run for their money from a couple of Districts that were able to show strong attendance this spring and fall.

Yes, it has been a busy year on all fronts for the Indiana Section, but hopefully most of you were able to join us at one of the WFP events or a District meeting. And I hope to see each and every one of you in February for what looks to be shaping up as one of our best programs ever.

## **Direct from the Director**

At the Board of Directors meeting in June the board voted to make changes to the membership fees and one of the membership categories. Dues will increase for most members by \$5.00. The dues will also increase for Utilities and Service Providers, with the exception of Small Systems and Small Service Providers. There will not be an increase to the Student Membership Fee.



AWWA had not raised membership fees for the previous two years due to the tough economy. Over the past several years staff has taken steps to reduce the operating budget by

over 4 million dollars. Cuts were made in many areas, wages were frozen and vacant positions were not filled.

For the last two years we've watched a slow decline in total members due to attrition, early retirements and budget tightening. More worrisome was the decline in paying members. The largest growing membership type has been Life Members which currently is 11% of total members. Current projects reflect that within 10 years over 25% of our members will fall into the Life Member category. We all know that no organization or business is sustainable with 25% of their members receiving free service.

At a special board meeting in September the AWWA Board of Directors voted to change the bylaws in regard to the Life Membership Category. In the past a person qualified for life membership after 30 years of membership. The new qualification for life membership will be 30 years of membership and obtaining the age of 65. All current life members will retain the title of life member. Now Life members will be required to pay membership dues at half the active member rate. Currently it will be Eighty-Five dollars. Once a person reaches the age of 65 and retires they may switch to the retired member category for \$35 dollars, or \$45 with Journal.

Life Member was the only membership category that was also an award. From now on Life membership will be a membership category and will no longer be an award. The 30 years of membership award be called by a new name, possibly the Water Steward Award. The new name is to be finalized at the November AWWA Executive Committee meeting.

## Safety Alert Proper Use of Heavy Equipment

A Tampa, Florida man was critically injured after a piece of heavy construction equipment ran him over. The injured was riding in the bucket of a front end loader when he was thrown to the ground following a series of bumps in the road. The equipment operator subsequently ran over the injured as he lay helplessly on the terrain.

Heavy equipment such as backhoes, excavators, front-end loaders and similar equipment are used for many jobs in utility work, and are essential for lifting and moving objects and materials. This equipment makes our jobs easier and safer if used properly.

Of the many heavy equipment injury-incidents that happen, few are caused by machinery or equipment failure. Most are caused, directly or indirectly, by carelessness and unnecessary hurry. Use safe procedures, pay attention to what is being done and how it is being done, and THINK about what you are doing - then heavy equipment safety isn't too difficult or time-consuming.

In particular, heavy equipment is not intended or designed for lifting people for any type of work. There are no safety features to provide support for people while in the bucket. System controls are not designed for safe movement of a loader bucket with a person in it.

Heavy equipment is also not intended, other than for the operator, to transport workers. Riding on the equipment in any manner is improper and dangerous. Serious injury or death can result from riding on heavy equipment. Remember:

- Do not allow anyone to ride or work in the bucket of a front-end loader.
- Do not use the bucket as a work platform.
- Do not ride on heavy equipment unless it is designed for passenger transport.




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
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## Water For People

#### 5th Annual Running for World Water 5K Fun Run and Walk presented by Franklin Electric and Preferred Pump

Over 570 runners, walkers, kids and dogs participated in this 3.1 mile run/walk which raises money for Water For People. ## Water Utility Council

#### Environmental Quality Service Council is assigned the Great Lakes

The Indiana General Assembly passed legislation during the 2011 legislative session to assign the Environmental Quality Service Council the responsibility to review and discuss various topics regarding the Great Lakes and its Indiana watersheds. These issues include funding available for water quality, supply and protection; water consumption; levels of pollution and sources; impacts on recreation and natural habitats; impact of invasive species (Asian Carp); current laws, regulations, and infrastructure affecting the GLs including the "Compact"; current laws, regulations, and infrastructure affecting shipping on the GLs and other matters relevant to the conditions of the GLs and its watershed.

On September 30<sup>th</sup>, the EQSC met in Portage to have a discussion on these matters. Representatives from the Council on Environmental Quality, IDNR, Lake Michigan Costal Program, IDEM and the Council of State Governments gave presentations on the various subjects required by the IGA.

Indiana has three watersheds that drain to the Great Lakes. Northwest Indiana and the St. Joseph River flow into Lake Michigan. The Maumee River flows into Lake Erie.

IDEM Commissioner Tom Easterly spoke on IDEM's responsibilities to the Great Lakes, funding available, and water quality. IDEM GLs major efforts for Lake Michigan involve the dredging of the Little Calumet River to remove polluted sediments; water sampling for beach use, and to monitor and reduce pollution entering the lake. Commissioner Easterly listed among the IDEM's top concerns of the Great Lakes as Invasive species, untreated sewage discharge and contaminated river/lake sediment.

The EQSC will issue a report at the end of October to the Indiana General Assembly on its findings and recommendations.

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

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

#### BESOZZI YOUTH DELEGATE GRANT HISTORY

Mr. Leo Besozzi was born in Massachusetts in 1902. In 1926 Mr. Besozzi departed Valparaiso University with a Bachelor of Science degree and a Graduate of Science degree in Civil Engineering. He then settled in Hammond, Indiana where he spent his professional life in planning and supervising the construction of numerous public works projects for the City of Hammond and many other cities and towns in Lake County. Mr. Besozzi held lifetime memberships in the American Water Works Association along with several other professional associations.

Mr. Besozzi passed away, at 95, in December 1997. In his will he instructed that \$10,000 of his estate be given to the Indiana Section AWWA to invest. The interest from this investment is to be used to "pay the expenses of a young delegate or delegates to the annual meeting of the American Water Works Association. The executive committee of the Indiana branch of the American Water Works Association is to select a young delegate or delegates who have never been to an annual meeting of this Association. They are to gather water supply and water treatment information..." This \$10,000 has been invested in a mutual fund, and the earnings are anticipated to be \$500-600 per year to be given as grants.

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
