

Direct from the Director

I am a magazine and newspaper "junkie". I get at least six different periodicals sent to my home, and another six or seven sent to my office. Since I rarely watch television (football excepted) this is how I stay in touch with the world. The problem is, I never seem to have time to read each one, and often end up throwing something away to make room for an updated issue in my "reading" pile. Unfortunately, this is sometimes true of my AWWA publications.

Most AWWA membership categories receive both Opflow and Journal AWWA. Opflow provides hands-on information about water systems that is valuable to everyone in the water industry. The Journal tends to be more technical in nature. I do a pretty good job staying current with Opflow, but I'm lucky if I get through half of the Journals I get.

Fortunately, I did take the time to read the October Journal. In it was an article summarizing the State of the Industry (SOTI) report for 2008. This report compiles and analyzes the results of more than 1,800 surveys sent in by water professionals from all over North America. It does a great job assessing the challenges we all are going to face in the months and years ahead.

The SOTI points out that the biggest concern to the water industry as a whole is source water supply and protection. Fortunately for us, Indiana is blessed with some of the most prolific aquifer systems in the world, and we have access to strong surface water sources as well. That is not to say we don't have source water concerns in certain locations around the state, but for the most part we are in great shape compared to the rest of the country.

The next highest ranked areas of concern are "business factors", "regulatory", "infrastructure", and "workforce". The common thread through each of these issues is financial. We must do a better job insuring we can afford the investment necessary to build and maintain water systems that provide sufficient quantities with the highest quality. In addition, we must be able to provide compensation packages to utility personnel that insure we keep high caliber people necessary to make our water systems go.

AWWA has a number of tools available to assist us in promoting "full cost" pricing for our precious product. At the Association level, the "Only Tap Water Delivers" program is designed for this purpose. At the Section level, our "Indiana Drinking Water-Safe, Reliable and Secure" video is another tool for our use. Recently our

sister association, IRWA, published the "IRWA Utility Manual" which is designed to give Board Members and all decision makers a good, basic understanding of the need to run utilities like a business. If we are to be good stewards of the water industry, we must first get



buy-in from consumers and elected officials so we have the resources necessary to meet the needs of tomorrow. If you need help getting access to these educational tools, drop me a line at james.williams@peerlessmidwest.com.


We thank our numerous hosts, our wonderful instructors who taught these 144 workshops, and

A fine buffet luncheon was provided after the meeting.



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



Executive Board Meeting



Bylaws

Alan Wiseman, Secretary-Treasurer

The AWWA Board of Directors last approved the Indiana Section Bylaws in June 2004.

The Section has recently suggested revisions using the "Standard Bylaws for AWWA Sections" model as a template. There are no instances where they are in conflict with AWWA's Governing Documents or Bylaws.

Notes on the substantive revisions are as follows:

Article IV – Headquarters, Operation, and Finances

Added language noting that the section headquarters will be the location of the section staff.

Article V – Officers

Modified the language for holding elected office from the "Standard Bylaws for AWWA Sections" model.

Article VII - The Executive Board

Added language for an alternate representative to attend the Executive Board meeting.

Article XI – Amendments Added language noting that amendments to section bylaws will be announced to the membership 30 days prior to the section annual conference.

The proposed amendments (listed on pg 20) will be voted on by our membership at the next Annual Conference Business Meeting scheduled to be held during the Awards Luncheon on February 18, 2009 in Indianapolis. Ratification of such must be attained by a 2/3 majority vote of those present at the Business Meeting and subsequently validated by the AWWA Board of Directors at their next Annual Conference in San Diego during June 2009.

Proposed Bylaw Amendments

ARTICLE IV. HEADQUARTERS, OPERATION, AND FINANCES

AMEND paragraph 1. by removing "the office of the Secretary of the Section" and replacing with "that of Section Staff". The paragraph shall read as follows:

1. The headquarters of the Section shall be that of Section Staff, unless otherwise designated by the Executive Board.

AMEND paragraph 3. to add "ed" to the end of "assess". The paragraph shall read as follows:

3. <u>Dues:</u> Dues shall be assessed against members as required for membership in AWWA. The section may, in accordance with the procedures defined in the Governing Documents and established guidelines of AWWA, apply for permission to levy a section dues assessment. The section assessment would be levied annually at the time of membership renewal, and the revenue collected would be used to increase the funds available for section uses consistent with AWWA objectives and policies. Once approved, changes in a section assessment can be authorized by a vote of the Section Board of Trustees for submission to and approval by the AWWA Board of Directors.

AMEND paragraph 5. to add "or review" to the 2nd and 3rd sentences. The paragraph shall read as follows:

3. <u>Financial Controls:</u> All section finances shall be managed in accordance with the bylaws, the Section's policies and procedures, the Bylaws and Governing Documents of the American Water Works Association, and all applicable financial rules and regulations of the State of Indiana. The Section shall conduct, on an annual basis, an independent audit <u>or review</u> of all Section finances. The audit <u>or review</u> shall be conducted by a qualified financial advisor who is neither an employee of the Section, nor a member of the Section Executive Board.

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS

AMEND paragraph 3. by removing "except a multi-section member" and adding "in accordance with the governing documents of the American Water Works Association. The paragraph shall read as follows:

3. Any member of the Section shall be eligible to hold elective office in the section in accordance with the governing documents of the American Water Works Association.

ARTICLE VII. THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

Amend paragraph 1. by inserting "In the event a Trustee is unable to attend a given Executive Board meeting, an alternate may be sent as his representative. The designated alternative shall be an officer from that district represented by the Trustee, either President, Vice-President, or Secretary-Treasurer of said district. The designated alternative shall have the same responsibilities and privileges as the Trustee for which he serves as an alternate.

ARTICLE VIII. ELECTION OF OFFICERS

AMEND paragraph 3. by replacing "annual banquet" with "business meeting". The revised paragraph shall read as follows:

3. Newly-elected officers shall be installed at the annual Section meeting immediately prior to the adjournment of the business meeting.

ARTICLE XI. AMENDMENTS

REVISE paragraph 1. by replacing "60" with "30". The revised paragraph shall read as follows:

 Proposals for the amendment of these Bylaws may originate by a vote of the Executive Board, or by submission to the Secretary-Treasurer of a written petition signed by at least 10 members of the Section. Upon an amendment being proposed, these Bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members of the Section present and voting at the annual Section meeting. All amendments shall be announced by the Secretary-Treasurer to the membership 30 days prior to the annual Section meeting.



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
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
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
